



What is Threatening Ka'elepulu Wetland?



Where is Ka'elepulu Wetland?

Ka'elepulu Wetland is a privately-owned 5.8 acre wetland located at the south-west end of Ka'elepulu Pond, also known as Enchanted Lake in Kailua, Oahu, Hawaii. Ka'elepulu Wetland provides habitat for native Hawaiian waterbirds - coots, gallinules, and stilts - as well as migratory birds such as the Golden Plover.

What is Threatening Ka'elepulu Wetland?

- This wetland has biological, endemic predator, introduced predator, invasive plant, and man-made threats.
- Man-made threats include street run-off, fertilizers, draining of swimming pools, hunting, and trash.
- The Bishop Estate's Supplemental Declaration of Protective Provisions stated that it desired to provide for the continued care, maintenance, repair and control of the lake for the mutual benefit of the owners within the Enchanted Lake Residents Association. However, the Protective Provisions expired in 2016.
- Therefore, in addition to the challenges of maintaining the lake, the Residents Association needs to look to the future and determine how best to provide for the continued care of the lake, and modify or re-certify the Protective Provisions. The Residents Association board will be working closely with the membership over the next few years to ensure this is accomplished.

What Can You Do to Help?
